Schweisshund Level 2 Test

1000 Metres and 16 to 24 Hours Old

Introduction

The Schweisshund Level 2 Test takes the foundation Level One Test to a more advanced level. The tracking element of the test is comprised of a more advanced blood trail that has been aged between 16 to 24 hours which demands more of the hound. It also has a more advanced obedience test.

General Rules

1. To compete in the Schweisshund Tracking Test Level 2, Hounds must be at least nine months of age on the day of the test, and have passed the Level 1 Test.
2. Hounds will work singly, in an order which is to be decided by ballot prior to the test. Each hound will be given a maximum of forty five minutes to complete the track.
3. The Society will appoint two Judges, a Tracking Judge and a Reporting Judge, along with two Assistants (who can be Judge's in training), to judge each hound.
4. The Judges' decision is final.
5. Hounds on passing the test will be awarded a Diploma, with the grade of I, II or III, depending on the number of points obtained. Table of points and grades can be found at the end of the test rules.
6. All hounds must be worked on a tracking line no less than six metres and wear a suitable tracking collar or harness.
7. In the event of snow cover the test will be cancelled.

Creation of the Track

1. For the laying of the track, cleaves of a deer or a boar are used along with 250ml of the appropriate blood.
2. The cleaves are attached to purpose made tracking shoes or a purpose made tracking stick with an attachment which the cleave is fastened. The cleaves will be no older than 24 hours, and may be either from a carcass or freshly defrosted.

3. When laying a trail with the use of a tracking stick, a cleave from one of the hind legs of the chosen quarry species must be used. For the tracking shoes, one cleave from a foreleg and one cleave from a hind leg of a deer or a boar are used. Each limb can be used for a maximum of three tracks. The tracking stick and tracking shoes must be approved by the Society.
4. The blood should be dispersed using a 250ml bottle with a tapering nozzle approved by the Society.
5. The person who lay's the track should be unknown to the hound which is going to work the track.
6. The track will be approximately 1000 metres long.
7. The track begins with a marker, showing the direction of the track.
8. The track should be visible to the owner for the first 50 metres. The rest of the track marking should be visible only to the judges.
9. Along the track there will be two 90 degree turns and two couches. Other bends in the tracks are permitted to allow for the terrain, but must be shallow and gently curving. A couch is made by removing leaf litter (around 0.75 metre square) and placing a generous amount of blood and hair in the couch area. The first couch is placed around 350 metres and the second between 800 and 900 metres from the beginning of the track.
10. A deer or boar carcass is placed at the end of the track.
11. The person who lays the track writes and signs a plate with a number, date and time when the track was made and places it at the beginning of the track.
12. The distance between each track will be a minimum of 100 metres.

Working the Track

1. The track will be aged between sixteen and twenty-four hours before the test commences.
2. The Reporting Judge and an Assistant will, after placing the carcass, move back from the track and hide so that the handler and hound cannot see them but they are in a good position to observe the work of the hound at the carcass.
3. The Tracking Judge and an Assistant, who are to observe the handler and hound, show the handler the beginning of the track and the track direction for the first fifty metres by means of a marker at the fifty meter mark.

4. On the handlers command, the hound should find the track, and start searching and work calmly with its nose primarily to the ground. In the case of blood being placed on higher parts of the undergrowth, the hound is allowed to put its head up.
5. The hound should keep on the track at all times and find all the turns.
6. It is permissible for the hound to show the handler other tracks. If the hound starts to follow other tracks for a short distance but then corrects itself, it is not to be taken as a mistake. Taking small shortcuts on small bends is also not a mistake.
7. In the event of the hound losing the track without returning to the track over a distance of approximately seventy five metres, it can be taken back to the track a maximum of three times, each time it is to be returned to the place where it had lost the track. Every time the grade is reduced by one point.
8. Should the Tracking Judge feel that the hound is not capable of following the track, the hound will be disqualified.
9. The handler must not look for the markers showing the way of the track. Each time, the judges will give a warning to the handler about the reduction in the grade or may disqualify the handler and hound.
10. Any vocal encouragement given to the hound should be kept to a minimum. Over encouragement and shouting may result in points being deducted.

Behaviour by the Carcass

1. At a point fifty metres before the end of the track, the Judge will verbally stop the handler and his/her hound with instructions to remove the tracking leash and let the hound continue hunting the remainder of the track loose. *See Reporting.*
2. The hound should find the carcass unaided.
3. At the carcass the hound is allowed to bite and rag the carcass. Licking of the shot wound is allowed but attempts from the hound to eat the carcass will be penalised.
4. The handler is not to move forward until told to by the Judges at which time the handler can go forward praising his or her hound. If the hound reports, the handler should make the Judges aware of the fact so the hound can be given sufficient time to carry out the task.
5. If the hound guards the carcass not allowing the Judge to approach, it is not to be penalised unless it is guarding the carcass from its handler, at which point the hound will be disqualified.

6. Any vocal encouragement given to the hound should be kept to a minimum over encouragement and shouting may result in a points being deducted.

Reporting

Any one of the following three methods will be considered as reporting. Before the tracking test commences, the handler should tell the Judge which method the hound will use.

1. **Announcing Hound** – The hound should on finding the carcass, after a short time return to its handler. The Reporting Judge will signal the Tracking Judge, to confirm that the hound had reached the carcass and has left to announce its find to the handler. The hound must show a sign of it's find to the handler. The Tracking Judge will then allow the handler to follow his hound back to the carcass.
2. **Baying Hound** - The hound on finding the carcass, must stay next to it and bark until the handler arrives. The Reporting Judge will signal the Tracking Judge, to confirm that the hound had reached the carcass. The hound should rhythmically bark or bay, with passion and without long breaks. After approximately five minutes, the Tracking Judge will then allow the handler to move forward to the carcass.
3. **Bringsel** –The hound on finding the carcass, will after a short time pickup it's bringsel and return to the handler carrying the bringsel, then lead the handler to the carcass. The hound must have the bringsel in its mouth on returning to the handler otherwise points will be deducted.

Discipline Component of the Test

Cooperation and Behaviour - This interplay is observed between the handler and the hound continually through out the Test by the Judges. Hounds should obey commands quickly.

Sit and Stay - The hound will be told to sit. The handler may leave an item (e.g. hat or roe sack) with his or her hound. The handler will then retreat fifty metres and hide out of sight of the hound. If the hound lays down this is permissible as long as it doesn't move forward or start barking. After approximately two minutes, on command from the Judge, a shot will be fired and after another two minutes another shot fired. After a further one minute the Judge will then allow the handler to return back to his/her hound. In the event of the hound running off, the hound should come back to its handler within 10 minutes. Any hound chasing domestic livestock will be disqualified.

Glossary

Cleave(s) The Cloven hoof (foot) of a ruminant animal species

Couch A place where an animal lays down to rest, the presence of blood indicates that the animal is wounded.

Bringsel A leather strap or fob or similar object attached to the hound's collar.
